Psalms Praising the Goodness of God

- Article "The Hallelujah Psalms" (p. 68)
- Note the three-part pattern that occurs in most of these
 - A call to praise
 - Reasons why God should be praised
 - Further calls to praise

Lessons for Today

- Psalm 100 exhorts us to come before the Lord with joy and gladness. Does this characterize our worship?
- If we put our trust in men, we are sure to be disappointed. "Trust in the Lord with all your heart ..." (Prov. 3:5-6)

Psalm 100 - "An Exhortation to Worship"

- Song #60 "All People That On Earth Do Dwell"
- Vv. 1-3
 - Begins like a trumpet blast
 - Note the joyful words in the first two verses: "joyful shout", "gladness," "with singing"
- Q2. What reason is given that demands our worship?
- He is God
- He has made us and not we ourselves
- We are His people


Psalm 100 - "An Exhortation to Worship"


- Vv. 4-5 Repeats the pattern of vv. 1-3
 - A similar exhortation to v. 1
 - Here, emphasizes thanksgiving, praise, and blessing
- Q3 For what three enduring things is God praised?
 - His goodness, mercy, and truth
- A timeless psalm
 - "The aspects of worship that this psalm stresses are constant factors that deserve to be noted wherever and whenever God's people come together." (Leupold)



- Vv. 1-2 A summons to praise God
 - Resolves to praise the Lord has long as he lives
- Vv. 3-4 Negative counsel: put no trust in princes
- Q4 Who should we not put our trust in? Why not?
 - In princes or any man
 - Because there is no help in him
 - His spirit departs he dies, and his plans perish; only God, who is everlasting, can be trusted to guide us.
 - Proverbs 3:5-6

- Vv. 5-9 Positive counsel: hope in the Lord
 - Theme "Happy is he whose hope is in the Lord his God."
 - God is the only One in whom men can truly trust for help
 - Vv. 6-9 illustrate why
 - He who made all things can most certainly control what He made
 - His benevolent providence is obvious
- Q5 List the classes of people God will help.
 - The oppressed, the hungry, the prisoners, blind, bowed down, the righteous, strangers, fatherless, widow.

- V. 10 The Lord's unending kingship
 - Closes with some final expressions of praise
 - God rules over all and eternally
 - Does he rule in your heart? Do you truly put your trust in Him?
 - Let us praise the Lord!

"In the whole collection there is not a more cheering Psalm, its tone is elevated and sustained throughout, faith is at its best, and speaks nobly. A German physician was wont to speak of it as the best preservative in times of cholera, and in truth it is a heavenly medicine against plague and pest. He who can live in its spirit will be fearless." (Spurgeon)

- Q1 The refuge we have in God is magnified in this psalm. What are some of the things He protects against?
- Snare of the fowler traps; pestilence; terror at night; the arrow that flies by the day; destruction; any evil; plagues; treading the lion and cobra.

- Vv. 1-2 we can trust in God to be our refuge and fortress
 - Abiding under the shadow ... like a mother hen (v. 4)
- Vv. 3-8 the evils from which God delivers those who trust in Him
 - Note some of the phrases that bear this out
 - Note the different times of day
 - God will deliver at all times

- Vv. 9-13 the complete security enjoyed by those
 - It's because we make God our dwelling place that this deliverance will come
 - Vv. 11-12
 - Quoted by Satan Mt. 4:5-6
 - Certainly a misuse of this passage
 - Very much figurative
 - Guardian angels? (see Hebrews 1:14)
 - No indication of specific ones. However, it should give us confidence that angels are at work in the spirit realm on our behalf.
 - V. 13 again very figurative
- Vv. 14-16 God's rich promise to those who love Him

Psalms Praising the Goodness of God

- Psalm 99 (Vv. 4, 6, 8-9)
 - Let men praise the holy one of Israel
- Psalm 103 (Vv. 8-14)
 - Praise for the mercies of the Lord
- Psalm 113 (Vv. 5-6)
 - The unique greatness of the Lord
- Psalm 117 (Vv. 1-2)
 - Israel's blessings are the hope of the Gentiles

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
